SP 4000 and 4001, shown above in Colfax, California in 1910, were the first of seventeen 2-8-8-2 MC-1 locomotives ordered by Southern Pacific specifically for use on the route through the Donner Pass. They were put in service in

1909 from Sacramento to Reno, but the smoke and gas they created in Donner's tunnels and sheds were more than crews could tolerate. After several experiments and discussions, the idea of putting the cab in front was chosen. The remaining order was quickly modified to MC-2 and the first cab-forwards were delivered later that year. The SP 4000 was converted to a cab-forward class MC-2 in 1928.
