



Stephen L. Newman 1947 ~ 2021

Stephen L Newman, 74, of Los Osos, California, passed away peacefully in his sleep at home on December 29, 2021 after a

valiant eight-month battle with pancreatic cancer.

Steve was born and raised in California. After graduating from high school, he was hired by Southern Pacific where he worked as a brakeman until joining the US Army in 1966. He was stationed at Fort Ord, California, Fort Stewart, Georgia, Viet Nam, and Fort Campbell, Kentucky. After his honorable discharge, he returned to the railroad where he worked as a freight conductor for 42 years until his retirement in 2007.

Steve was a man with many talents. He was an excellent gardener who could grow anything from seed. His legacy includes many bonsai trees that were cultivated for years with love. He was a builder who fabricated beautiful fences, gates, and outbuildings for his family. He had an artistic side that came out in his wood working skills. He was an auto enthusiast who always kept his cars in immaculate condition. He exercised regularly by riding his bike to town several days a week to buy his lottery tickets: one Mega, one Power, one Super, and one Scratcher. Though he never did hit the big jackpot, he surely tried.

Steve is survived by his wife of 55 years Bonnie; his daughter, Jennifer Newman and son, Stephen (Pamela) Newman; grandchildren Zackery DeLong and Hannah Newman; brothers, Larry Newman and Doug Newman; and brother-in-law Dallas (Delane) Allen. He was preceded in death by his father and mother, John and Dorothy Newman.

Steve lived a good life; he was an honorable man who loved and cared for his family. Rest in peace my love, until we meet again.

Editor's note: Bonnie Newman added the following about Steve's Southern Pacific career. Steve was employed in 1965 by Southern Pacific upon graduating from Mt. Diablo High School in Concord, California. He was a brakeman on freight trains and worked out of Oakland on the extra board, but sometimes had hold downs. He was promoted to conductor and worked 42 years until his retirement on April 1, 2007.

He most often worked from Oakland to Roseville, but he would sometimes be assigned as a flagman at various locations, which he liked, because he knew what his hours would be. I remember he once worked on a local in the Napa area when trains still had a caboose. The guys would bring part of the meal each night and they would cook on the caboose.

# THREE VETERANS OF S. P. LAUDED AT RETIREMENT

Three veteran employees of the Southern Pacific Railroad can take it easy tonight, with a combined 136 years of service behind them, and the well-wishes of officials and fellow workers launching them into the comparative quiet of retirement.

Local railroad officials were on hand Thursday to greet the retiring trio and wish them continued good health and full enjoyment of their pensions. They were lauded for their many years of faithful service on for Southern Pacific. Engineer Wilfred Bourgeois, Engineer William B. Babin, and Conductor E. L. Logan are the three, all of the Lafayette-New Orleans passenger service. Mr. Babin took his last train out of Lafayette at 2:38 p.m. today, the Alamo. Crewmates Bourgeois and Logan made their last run out of Lafayette at 3:35 a.m. Thursday aboard the Argonaut.

The veteran conductor, well known to residents of this area, entered the railroad's service on May 5, 1904, as a supply man in the shops. He transferred to train service on September 5, 1904 as a brakeman. On March 5, 1913, he was promoted to conductor, and has been on the New Orleans to Lafayette passenger runs since April 1, 1922. He is a resident of Lafayette.

Mr. Bourgeois became an employee of the Southern Pacific in the Algiers shops on February 1, 1901. He was transferred to the position of fireman on April 21, 1906, was promoted to locomotive engineer November 22, 1912, and has remained at that post ever since. He resides in New Orleans.

Mr. Babin started out as an iron worker in the Algiers shops. He was transferred to the position of locomotive fireman on October 3, 1904 and won promotion to locomotive engineer on November 13, 1909. He has been at the throttle on the New Orleans-Lafayette runs ever since. He, too, is a resident of New Orleans.

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
