After joining the Air Force, he discovered Illinois and spent his leave in Chicago, where he met his future wife, Shirley. The two of them joined the migration of young people to San Francisco and enjoyed the excitement of that special time. In 1968, they married at City Hall and shortly thereafter decided to return to Illinois where Rich was hired by the Rock Island Railroad. He was embraced by Shirley's family and loved them deeply. He was not as fond of the Chicago winters where he had to work outside all night so the decision was made to return to San Francisco and hire out on Southern Pacific Railroad.

His precious baby girl Kelly brightened his days in San Francisco, Mill Valley and San Rafael and his son Tom completed the family in Santa Venetia ever giving his dad reasons to be proud.. After retiring from that service, he joined the maintenance staff at the Marin Civic Center and volunteered to paint, help with parking at the Fair annually and many other miscellaneous duties. His favorite was when he was asked to raise and lower the flags on the Avenue of The

Flags. What an honor that was for him and he did it diligently for many years with great dignity and pride. He also spent many enjoyable hours volunteering with Friends of China Camp, the Civic Center Station Plan, and the Santa Venetia Neighborhood Association.

When he was not volunteering, he enjoyed watching the Giants, the 49ers, the Sharks, and the CAL Bears. Rich and Shirley had season tickets to the Bears for eight glorious seasons.

He was a father to eight and a grandfather to many. He was a recent widower to his beloved wife, Marilyn Adele Russum (Flynn), who he cherished deeply.


